



Dr. Bal will provide a brief overview of the state of science related to ASD in adulthood, with an emphasis on highlighting five areas that should guide current practices and future research.

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1) Navigating the DDD Service System • Room BCD

Services Workshop Sponsor: Devereux New Jersey

This workshop will provide an overview of the intake and eligibility process related to the Supports Program and the Community Care Program operated by DDD. Topics will include the relationship between Medicaid eligibility and program eligibility, Medicaid Waiver services available in each program, and a brief review of the support coordination agency selection process and the role of the support coordinator.


2) Community Housing with Supports • Gold Room

Paul Prior, Esq. and Maria Fischer, Esq.; Hinkle, Fingles, Prior & Fischer

Recent national trends regarding service delivery for people with intellectual/developmental disabilities will have significant impacts on supportive housing. Statewide system changes are providing more options while placing more responsibilities upon the consumers making these decisions. The presenters will discuss how these trends will influence supportive housing in New Jersey. SHA's publication, The Journey to Community Housing with Supports, describes a variety of housing models and will be referenced. The presenters will discuss how innovative elements can be incorporated into affordable housing in a variety of residential settings and how individual budgets can utilize multiple sources such as NJ Medicaid Waivers, state plan services, housing assistance and mainstream resources to fund housing and supportive services.

3) Environmental Enrichment and Challenging Behaviors: How Making Life Better Keeps Challenging Behaviors from Getting Worse • Room A Beth Glasberg, Ph.D., BCBA-D and Deborah Silver, M.A., BCBA; *The Success Center*

Challenging behaviors among adults often result in restrictive placements that limit access to preferred items and activities as well as limiting the ability to contribute up to one's potential. However, this often serves the purpose of limiting risk rather than eliminating the problem behavior. In fact, as the individual has fewer options for appropriate behavior and consequently fewer reinforcement opportunities, the challenging behavior may actually worsen. This presentation will describe an alternative model of intervention focusing on environmental enrichment. By filling an individual's day with more preferred forms of stimulation, both through free access and through the opportunity to earn reinforcers through preferred or meaningful tasks, challenging behaviors may be reduced. With efficacy documented through both clinical practice and research, this strategy offers a safer and more positive approach to behavior reduction for individuals in need of more support and more independent individuals alike.

4) Parenting Individuals with Severe Challenging Behavior • Gold Room Bobbie Gallagher, Ph.D., BCBA-D; Lisa McCauley Parles, Esq.; Steven Pelligrinelli; and Neng Wang, M.S.; *parents*

Services Workshop Sponsor: Devereux New Jersey

This session will be a panel of parents sharing their experiences. Their children range in age from teens to adults. Some live at home, and some are in residential placements. Parents will be discussing what it is like to manage their children's severe challenging behavior, interventions that worked and those that didn't, and their recommendations to improve the existing system of care.

5) A Comprehensive Approach to Disability Planning: A Blueprint for the Long Term • Room BCD

Elizabeth Shea, J.D., M.P.A.P. and Deirdre Wheatley-Liss, J.D.; *Porzio Bromberg & Newman*

Long-term planning is essential for individuals with special needs regardless of age or level of disability. This practical workshop will help families assess their current status and identify key areas where future planning is needed, along with sharing the steps they can take to be prepared for the future. Topics will include completing a self-assessment, accessing government services, guardianship, special needs trusts, employment, medical care, finding quality residential services, housing vouchers, in-home supports, and care coordination. Tips on navigating DDD's feefor-service system will also be discussed by the former Assistant Commissioner. Professionals are welcome to bring the blueprint tools back to their clients.

6) Self-Regulation & Problem-Solving: Critical Skills for Success • Room A Rebecca Schulman, Psy.D., BCBA-D, *Behavior Therapy Associates*

Individuals with ASD are commonly presented with situations where their ability to demonstrate emotional and behavioral control has significant consequences to the individual, peers, school, workplace, community, and family. The individual and those providing support need to be prepared with concrete strategies to quickly and effectively engage in problem-solving when things don't go as planned. Dr. Schulman will provide user-friendly, evidence-based strategies to foster self-regulation and problem-solving, including systematic steps from the POWER-Solving® curriculum (participants do not have to use this curriculum to benefit from this workshop). Participants will design their own "ready position" steps corresponding to challenging situations that someone with ASD may experience student independence will be emphasized by discussing ways to introduce and fade supports, and to monitor progress.

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7) Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services • Room A

The NJ Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services provides employment and training services to individuals with disabilities. An overview of transition services will be explained with emphasis placed on Title IV of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act which details funding toward pre-employment transition services for students and youth with disabilities.

8) Financial Planning and Guardianship for the Individual with Special Needs in Your Life • Gold Room

Special needs planning is a subset of estate planning. Estate planning may bring to mind families with great wealth, but that is not true. In the special needs planning context, it simply means organizing your estate, whatever its size, to meet the needs of the entire family as efficiently and economically as possible. The goal for families with a member requiring special consideration is the same: to provide a more certain future for the individual as well as the rest of the family. This can be done at any age, but it is for a child that we can most effectively plan because you have the benefit of time to get the right advice and to develop and implement the plan.

9) The Transition to Adult Day Services: Preparation and Survival • Room BCD Jessica Fedezko, M.A., BCBA and John Barnard, M.Sc.Ed., BCBA;, *Bancroft*



Important skills necessary to succeed in these new settings will be presented along with a review of ways we prepare individuals ages 15-21 for this experience. 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10) Planning for a Successful Life After Graduation: Considerations for the IEP Team • Room BCD

Parents, students, educators, and other agency professionals all have a critical role in the development and implementation of effective IEPs that include transition planning, yet many may be unsure about what their specific role is and how to do it. Together, we will explore the combination of federal and state regulations and evidence-based practices that prepare students for a successful transition from school to adult life. Attendees should come prepared with their questions about the transition process as we will spend time discussing specific questions and practical strategies..

11) Successfully Appealing Insurance Denials of ABA for Adults: How to "Get it Done!" • Gold Room


An attorney and a behavior analyst will review state and federal laws and other strategies which parents and providers should use to prohibit health insurers from discriminatory denials of ABA therapy based on age. They will also address Medicaid's requirement to cover ABA therapy for those under age 21. Participants will be provided with a list of typical denials and potential appeal responses, language to include in their medical documentation to support services after age 18, and research supporting the efficacy of ABA therapy for adults with ASD. This interactive discussion will provide real life strategies on how to use the research, along with the statutes and clinical documentation, to overcome arbitrary limits and denials. An outline of what an appeal should look like, sample appeal letters, and strategies to use in the appeal process will be provided.

12) Strategies for Accessing Adult Healthcare Providers • Room A Shayleigh Dickson, MSN, APN, CPNP-AC and Pat O'Hanlon; *Children's Specialized Hospital*

Services Workshop Sponsor: Devereux New Jersey

This workshop will focus on the transition from a pediatrician to an adult health care provider. It will be guided by The Autism Transition Tool® which was developed by the Autism Medical Home Transition Collaborative at Children's Specialized Hospital to fill a gap in resources for families of youth with ASD. The tool, which is evidence-based, practical, and replicable, is designed for use by pediatric primary care practices to prepare their patients for this transition. An Advanced Practice Nurse will present on the current state of healthcare transition service, key elements of the transition process, and resources for providers. A parent of a young adult with special needs with share resources, tips for families, and her family's transition story.
